Statistics

According to the HSE statistics in the 5 year period from 1996/97 to 2004/05 there were five fatal injuries to employees. In 2004/05 the 1,499 major injuries were divided as follows:

Legislation

Legislation requires that managers and employees should be competent to perform their work. A person is regarded as competent if they have sufficient training, experience and knowledge.

Under the Management of Health and Safety Regulations 1999; regulation 13 requires employers to provide adequate health and safety training.
