Statistics

The HSE statistics shows that in 2004/05, 32% % of all worker deaths were in the construction industry - 71 people died. The following were the types of major injuries:

Major Injuries	Occupational ill health injuries
Fall from a height	Musculoskeletal injuries
Slips and trips	Effects of noise
Hit by moving/falling objects	Asbestos related diseases
Lifting/carrying	Effects of vibration

Legislation

Legislation requires that managers and employees should be competent to perform their work. A person is regarded competent if they have sufficient training, experience and knowledge.

Under the Management of Health and Safety Regulations 1999; regulation 13 requires employers to provide adequate health and safety training.
